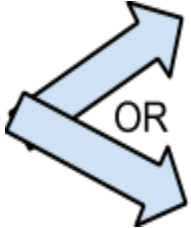


NOUN: a person, place, thing, or idea.

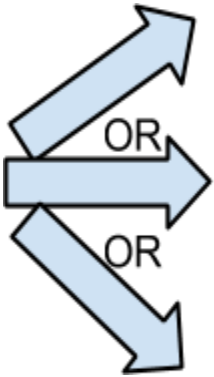
Types of Nouns:



COMMON NOUN: A noun that's not the name of any particular person, place, or thing; is not capitalized. For example, fish and chips.

PROPER NOUN: A noun belonging to names for unique individuals, events, or places; usually begin with a capital letter. For example, Sara and Seattle.

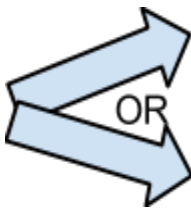
PLURAL NOUN: A noun that refers to more than one thing. Most nouns become plural with the addition of -s or -es, like chairs and dishes.



COMPOUND NOUN: Two or more nouns combined to form a single noun. Compound nouns are written as separate words (grapefruit juice), as words linked by a hyphen (sister-in-law), or as one word (schoolteacher).

COLLECTIVE NOUN: A noun (such as team, committee, or family) that refers to a group of individuals.

CONCRETE NOUN: A noun (such as chicken or egg) that names a material or physical object.



ABSTRACT NOUN: A noun (such as courage or freedom) that names an idea, event, quality, or concept.
