

NOUN: a person, place, thing, or idea.

Types of Nouns:



COMMON NOUN: A noun that's <u>not the name of any particular</u> person, place, or thing; is not <u>capitalized</u>. For example, <u>fish</u> and <u>chips</u>.

PROPER NOUN: A noun belonging to names for <u>unique</u> <u>individuals</u>, <u>events</u>, <u>or places</u>; usually begin with <u>a capital letter</u>. For example, <u>Sara</u> and <u>Seattle</u>.



PLURAL NOUN: A noun that refers to more than one thing. Most nouns become plural with the addition of -s or -es, like *chairs* and *dishes*.

COMPOUND NOUN: Two or more <u>nouns combined to form a</u> <u>single noun</u>. Compound nouns are written as separate words (<u>grapefruit juice</u>), as words linked by a hyphen (<u>sister-in-law</u>), or as one word (<u>schoolteacher</u>).

COLLECTIVE NOUN: A noun (such as <u>team</u>, <u>committee</u>, or <u>family</u>) that <u>refers to a group of individuals</u>.



CONCRETE NOUN: A noun (such as <u>chicken</u> or <u>egg</u>) that <u>names</u> a <u>material or physical object</u>.

ABSTRACT NOUN: A noun (such as <u>courage</u> or <u>freedom</u>) that names an <u>idea</u>, <u>event</u>, <u>quality</u>, <u>or concept</u>.
